^{24"} Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ²⁵ For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it.'" *Holy Bible*, New International Version®

Back in the Golden Age of television--gosh, it's kind of scary to tell you that I remember the Golden Age of anything—but back in the Golden Age of television, game shows were pretty popular and I can remember a favorite at my house was called "What's My Line?" Do any of you recall that one? A panel of celebrities would try to guess the occupation of a contestant by asking a series of questions. I hate to say that life is like a game show, but fortunately or not, life *is* full of questions, both the kind the panel might ask and the kind we ask ourselves...What am I doing with my life? Just what is my purpose here on earth? What will tomorrow bring? What is God's plan for me? What can I do to make this world a better place? Who am I, really?

In Chapter 16 of Matthew, Jesus questioned His disciples, asking, "Who do people say I am?" Some of them answered, "Elijah" and others said, "John the Baptist," but our old friend Peter, spoke up and said to Jesus," 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.'" With that answer, Peter moved to the head of the class...He became Jesus' star pupil because he understood that Jesus was not just a man, but the living Son of the living God, the Messiah long waited for, and Peter was pretty pleased with himself....He thought that he had everything figured out-He had become the Rock, indispensable to his Teacher and Friend, and he was feeling both proud and confident that he knew exactly what the future would hold. For Peter, the time of questioning was over....Or was it?

Jesus' answer about what the future held for Him was certainly not what Peter expected to hear. Jesus said bluntly that He would suffer at the hands of the religious leaders and be put to death, but that God would raise Him into newness of life on the third day. Jesus was explaining that He was to be a Servant, a Suffering Servant, whose death and resurrection would save the whole world. But Peter, out of love and respect, and perhaps, his own misguided ideas about what a Messiah should be, took Jesus aside and rebuked Him by saying that it wasn't possible, that this wasn't what the future should hold for Him. Peter could not contemplate, he could not fathom Jesus suffering and dying, not only because of his great love for Him, but also because he was having trouble understanding a Messiah Who was not a conqueror but a humble servant. Poor Peter—the same Peter who had been so right in realizing *Who* Christ was—was just as wrong in his knowledge of *why* Christ had come to earth. Peter just didn't get it and Jesus rebuked Peter with "'You're a stumbling block to me because you're not on the side of God but on the side of men!'"

Imagine the look on Peter's face...this star pupil had been demoted and sent to the back of the class. He just didn't comprehend that God's plan is not man's plan, and that no matter how much he would like to control the situation, it was out of his hands. Little did Peter know the crosses that lay ahead for him.

I don't have to tell you because I figure you already know that life is not easy and life is not fair. All of us have had, and will continue to, have crosses to bear...problems and concerns with family and friends, doubts about the future, especially in this time of COVID-19, fears about civil unrest and financial uncertainties, anxieties about a contentious election, worries about our health and the health of our loved ones. But no matter what cross you bear, remember that Jesus walks with you; no matter how heavy your burdens or deep your despair, Jesus matches you step for step...When Jesus Christ asks us to take up our crosses and follow Him, He doesn't say that life will be fair or worryfree and He certainly doesn't promise us blue skies and happy endings.

Jesus doesn't call us to lives of ease, but He does call us to lives of service and, yes, sacrifice but, above all, commitment to Him. When Jesus Christ calls us to take up our crosses and follow Him, He gives us a challenge, but also, a wonderful promise...that no matter how heavy the burden or how long the road, He will be with us...that our crosses are His crosses, too...that His comfort and love and presence are with us always, no matter what the future holds. This is our challenge and, although we don't always realize it. our blessing, still today...a challenge to live lives centered not on self or the world and its empty promises, but lives spent in discipleship, mercy and commitment anchored in the promise of God's mercy and grace and the love of our Savior and Lord Jesus Christ. *Written by Melissa Bannister*
