This year Easter came a little later than usual. I used to determine the timing of Easter to be around the opening of Trout season, or around the first weekend in April, but this year it comes on the third weekend, right before we are all compelled to have our income taxes filed on April 18. It has always been my experience with Easter, as well as Christmas, that when the day is over, its kind of a let down. We just expend so much energy into both seasons that when they are over, its back to life as normal. But this should not be that way. At Christmas we celebrated God coming down and lining with us, and Easter is our living resurrection promise. Both of these holidays are about God who loves us, who has dreams for us, who has arms for us and will not let us go. Both of these holidays are about our Creator who comes down to us and meets us in our joys and in our sorrows and walks with us as well as carries us, if need be, through our life's journeys.

The new life of Easter is so profound that we even find it in nature. Just look around you now and you will see the bulbs you planted last fall beginning to come up from the ground, or maybe even blooming. You will see the farmers plowing their fields which will soon receive the seeds of summer harvest. In a way, I feel, that those fields are much like our lives during the season of Lent. We have taken the time to ready ourselves, drawing closer to God while

recognizing that we all fall short of God's glory. Then, we like the crocuses break, through the ground to receive the new life of the Resurrection Spring. With plants its so natural that it becomes part of their rhythm of life.

Yet we do have the option to choose another rhythm. We can and often do choose our own avenues of gratification and so the joy of Easter becomes something that happens on April 17, this year, and it's a new day. Maybe during this upcoming Easter season we should reflect on how the resurrection has met you in your life. Always during the second Sunday of Easter we find the disciples behind the locked doors of the Upper Room in fear for the lives for following Jesus. Yet it was in that fear that Jesus met them and assured them that he was very much alive in their lives.

My biggest fear for our communities and most especially our churches is not that we fear witnessing about how Jesus has impacted our life, but that we have nothing to talk about. I believe the greatest danger to spreading the good news of Jesus is indifference. When we live that way we become different from the bulbs of nature. Those bulbs have no choice but to bud and spring up as

The great preacher William Slone Coffin once observed that 'its only a hop, skip and a jump from cool and laid back to dead and buried.' The Ukrainians are challenging us to remember what we have been too happy to forget, that life is a battlefield, a struggle of good and evil, of truth and lies."

So this Easter season, may we let the Spirit of Christ work within our lives. May we not be indifferent, but live in His presence so each of us can help bring new life to those around us. Allow Christ to be the life that dwells in you and be the driving force which will bring you to joy and happiness. May this time be for you a groundbreaking experience full of the Resurrected life.

Lord have mercy upon them in their suffering and have mercy upon us in our sin.

## Easter stewardship: Resurrection reset

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. -Romans 6:3-4

Christ is Risen! Risen, indeed! Alleluia!

The triumphant words we cherish every Easter signal more than just Jesus' victory over the grave. They announce for us the end of deadness and the start of a new life, a fresh beginning, in our earthly pilgrimage. Jesus was raised from the dead so that we, too, might walk in newness of life.

From Jesus' resurrection, our lives take on a new trajectory, a turn away from the values and precepts of the world and toward the kingdom of God. As we journey, our lives progressively align with the purposes and mission of God.

For a steward-disciple of our Lord, the implications are many. As we walk in newness of life, we might find ourselves

- Re-examining our relationship to "stuff" our money, our possessions, the things that might have given us a sense of security or worth. Jesus is our security and our worth.
- Drawing closer to family and friends. True wealth is measured by the love we give and receive. Our lives effervesce with the love we receive from God.
- Contributing more to church and charity. Jesus frees us from the grip that possessions have upon us. We can more freely give.
- Gathering into our lives what Paul calls the fruits of the spirit: "Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23).

May your lives as steward-disciples take a resurrection reset. Christ is risen! Risen indeed! Alleluia!
