- Church Service 10:00 or 10:15 a.m.

LUTHERAN IDENTITY

Introduction

Prayer:

Gracious Father, we pray for your holy Catholic Church. Fill it with all truth and peace for the sake of Jesus Christ, your Son, our Savior. Amen

When we pray for the Catholic Church, we pray for the whole church in all its diversity- believers who gather as Presbyterians, Methodists, Pentecostals, Baptists, Disciples, Episcopalians, Orthodox Christians, Congregationalists, Roman Catholics, Adventists, Mennonites, Lutherans, Reformed Christians, Friends and Covenanters. We pray for the faithful who gather in storefront missions, suburban structures, prisons and hospital chapels, homes, huts, stadiums, theaters, and cathedrals. We pray for all Christian communities in all lands, all cultures and circumstances, all who confess Jesus as Lord.

Within this beautiful mix we live as Lutheran Christians - a people sure of our name but not of our identity.

You may have had this happen to you. Someone says, so you go to a Lutheran church, do you? What is a Lutheran anyway? And you have a hard time answering that question.

Or you see wonderful things happening, churches growing. You hear about that churches pastor and how their church is growing because of how they worship. And you say, why don't we try that. The problem is when we don't understand and appreciate our identity, we are tempted to adopt whatever is popular and successful, we do whatever works.

You may also have had this statement made to you. "My friend if you haven't accepted Jesus as your personal savior, you will not go to heaven." Or maybe, the one I heard, "If you haven't been baptized like Jesus, it doesn't count."

When we are confronted by religious language which we don't hear in our Lutheran churches, we wonder if Lutheran pastors are really preaching the Bible. Often confused about our identity, unable to answer questions about our tradition and sometimes wanting our congregations to copy, without question what is popular in the religious marketplace we need to ask.

WHAT IS LUTHERAN CHRISTIANITY.

Going forward we will attempt to answer this question that avoids defining Lutheranism as a set of doctrines. We will be describing it as:

A WAY OF SEEING

A WAY OF HEARING

A WAY OF TEACHING

A WAY OF FOLLOWING

As Lutherans we have no monopoly on certain ways of being a Christian. What we will learn is that the total of all we talk about is the Lutheran Way of living. Hopefully when done we all will have a greater sense of what it means to be Lutheran.

STEWARDSHIP

I commend enjoyment, for there is nothing better for people under the sun than to eat, and drink, and enjoy themselves, for this will go with them in their toil through the days of life that God gives them under the sun. **Ecclesiastes 8:15**

Busy-ness keeps us from living with joy and peace in today's 24/7 world, but Scripture reminds us that this is hardly new. Ecclesiastes was written some 2,500 years ago! Ecclesiastes does not give license for mindless pleasure-seeking, but rather affirms that our hard work should be balanced with time for relaxation and enjoyment with friends and family.

Saints and mystics have long touted the need for rest and renewal. In the monastic tradition it's referred to as *otium sanctum* – Holy Leisure. Not just wasting our free time, but using it for renewal. As steward/disciples, we aim to use our leisure time wisely. Here are some ideas:

Keep the Sabbath: God actually *commands* us to stop working one day per week, as Exodus 20:8-11 makes clear. But there is no prohibition against leisure. (Why else would God give us a day off?)

Plan your vacation: Even if you're taking a STAYcation, *plan* your time for maximum rest and enjoyment.

Manage your schedule: Are you a slave to your appointment book, driven by *other people's* priorities? Put yourself first – scheduling in time for leisure. Even if it's just 30 minutes here and there!

Find an activity you like: What do you do just for you? Discover – or REdiscover – what brings you joy, then make time to do it.

Socialize: Friends and family make life enjoyable. Spend time with them.

Invest, don't waste, time: Many activities pass the time but don't give back much in renewal or refreshment. Choose activities wisely.

God expects us to work, but not work ourselves to death. Sabbath and leisure time provide means for us to find balance in our life, as well as friendship, love, renewal and purpose.
