This month we will celebrate our Independence, the freedom we enjoy as Americans. But for some time now, it seems as though we are free but have kind of freed ourselves from the confidence of everything around us. When we have little or no confidence in our government, in our leaders, and in the very things which have kept us grounded we lose our footing and are surely to fall. So I wondered about what to talk to you about, as we all struggle with this malaise that we call life. I decided to do what I always do when needing guidance and that is go to God's Word. The scripture that was so right on was Psalm 16. You see Psalm 16 is a prayer of trust that professes confidence in God. Our God is always there with us, He is the Truth and our Way and will be our guide. The very first line is a prayer that centers us, it says, "Keep me safe, O God, for I have come to you for refuge."

King David penned these words of this psalm, but Jesus lived them. As a boy of twelve his family journeyed to Jerusalem to celebrate his first Passover. They leave to go home with family and friends. But Jesus doesn't, he goes missing. His parents were frantic and they finally find him. His mother asked why did you treat us this way? Jesus said, why were you searching for me. Didn't you know I would dbe in y Fathers house. The boy grew up and later came to Jerusalem again for Passover. This time he enters the temple to find "men selling cattle, sheep and doves, and others sitting at tables exchanging money." So he made a whip out of cords, and drove all from the temple area. Such devotion to His Heavenly Father. And that devotion never tapered off. Our Savior never grew disillusioned or bitter, as he grew closer to Golgotha.

So it was when wearied by the frantic pace of his ministry and the constant demands of the crowds, our Savior went off to himself to pray. He did that often. For Jesus, the words, "Keep me safe, O God, for in you I take refuge," was his way of life. Strengthened by the Spirit, always immersed in God's Word, our Savior Jesus walked through this life as the epitome of a perfect trust in God the Father. Jesus confession is "I will not be shaken because the Lord is at my right hand."

Just think of those words, I will not be shaken, so much so he could sleep peacefully in the midst of a storm. Or I will not be shake, so I can stand my ground with Satan for 40 days, because God is at my right hand. This Jesus, the One whom Psalm 16 prophesies says, "As for the saints who are on the land, they are the glorious pnes in whom I delight." This is Jesus, the One who looked up into a sycamore tree and invited Zacchaeus to Tax Collector to dinner. Just as he ate with other sinners.

This is Jesus, who wants nothing more than to feast with you and me throughout all eternity. For we are by grace, the glorious ones in who Jesus delights. We do not deserve it. There are lots of things happening in our lives that shake us up, aren't they? Just listen to the news, not sure if what you are hearing is for real? And so your foundation is rocked. "I will

not be shaken", that is easier said than done, when you had one of those mothers of all arguments with your friend or your spouse. Or your child says, I hate you, and you cannot figure out why. Too often, too easily we are shaken aren't we. We fall apart at the seams, or at least crack a little.

And yet our Savior, will never leave our side. We remain his glorious ones in whom He delights. His saints are declared pure and holy through his blood. We are the ones who have received the Risen Saviors oath, "I will be with you always. I pray that during this Pentecost season that no matter how unstable we may feel, or how rocked to the core we may feel, that step by step, day by day that Jesus confession would be our own, "I Will not be shaken, because the Lord is at my right hand."

Stewardship of our civic freedoms

As Americans celebrate the birthday of our nation, we give thanks for our civic freedoms of speech, religion, assembly, due process, a speedy trial, voting and many more. Our freedom has made us the envy of much of the world.

But as with any valuable gift, our civic freedoms can be abused, neglected or underappreciated to the point where, if we aren't careful, they hardly matter anymore.

Lutherans are guided by Martin Luther's insight that we are simultaneously called to be responsible citizens of "two kingdoms" – first, of God's spiritual realm, and second, of earthly governments of people and laws. The synergy of our "dual citizenship" directs us to be good stewards of our civic freedoms.

Freedom of speech: Yes, even hateful speech and lies are protected under our Constitution, but Christians avoid them in obedience to Jesus' command to love our neighbor as ourselves and by the Eighth Commandment, which Luther explains in *The Small Catechism:* "We should fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations." We steward this freedom by speaking honestly and insisting others do, too.

Freedom of religion: Millions of people across the globe, including Christians, face persecution and discrimination because of their faith. We dare not take our freedom for granted, but exercise it with joy and defend the rights of others to follow their own consciences.

Freedom from illegal prosecution: Our guarantees of due process in legal, criminal and civil proceedings uphold justice and guard against government misconduct. It works imperfectly, as do all human systems, but as good stewards we fight for justice and the rights for all.

Freedom of self-governance: With its interconnected checks and balances, our three-branch system of government provides stability, accountability and flexibility for change. It's a great system, but it requires us to be informed and involved. We steward this freedom by participating in political processes, voting and insisting on honest government that works for our interests.

This month, as citizens of both God's spiritual realm and the United States of America, we renew our commitment to be good stewards of the freedoms we are privileged to have.
